The new APP


Our developer team is working hard on the first sketches for a fresh looking App that will make interacting with UN-aligned easier than ever.

TAIWAN AND ITS STRUGGLE FOR INDEPENDENCE

In our first issue, we introduced the Unrepresented Nations and Peoples Organisation and began to highlight the plight of some of its members, starting with the Ogoni people. In this issue we will focus on Taiwan.

Taiwan's geological ties to China

Taiwan was once part of mainland China... literally. It separated at the last ice age about 10,000 years ago, just as Great Britain had from continental Europe at about the same time. Blood is stronger than water, they say (rock in this case) and the ties just don't want to go away! Whilst the UK's reasons to distance itself from the mainland are nebulous, Taiwan's are not, and we only need to consider what is happening in Hong Kong to get the picture.

Taiwan's historic ties to China

Until the fifteenth century, Taiwan contained populations of indigenous chiefdoms. The natives were occupied with simple pursuits, such as fishing and headhunting (well, maybe not that simple!). Portuguese explorers referred to it as Ilha Formosa (Beautiful Island) and the name Formosa persisted in the west right up to the 20th century. By the time the Dutch arrived in the seventeenth century, there were only a few Chinese outposts.

The Dutch lasted less than 40 years as they

were ousted by Koxinga, in 1662. He was a Ming "loyalist" fleeing form the newly founded Qing Dynasty (sounds familiar?). In 1683 the Qing invaded the island and put it decisively under Chinese control.

After the loss of the First Sino-Japanese War in 1895, however, the Chinese formally surrendered Taiwan to Japan. The situation only changed after World War II. The surrender did not formally cede the island to China. Nevertheless, the fact that the USA went out of its way to ferry representatives form there for the formal surrender suggests that that was the consensus.

The UN betrays the Republic of China

Complications started in 1949 with the civil war in China. The Republic of China (ROC), the legitimate government, was being swept away by the communist forces of Mao Zedong. The Chinese government under the leadership of Chiang Kai-shek was being ousted from one stronghold to another. The situation was going from bad to worse, so the legitimate government of China (ROC) fled to Taiwan, taking many of China's treasures with them. This left Mao in control of most of mainland China and shortly after, the whole of the mainland, including Tibet.

So, mainland China became the People's Republic of China (PRC), while Taiwan was all that remained of the Republic of China. Both claimed sovereignty over the other and of course the UN recognised the ROC, which was the legitimate government.

Then, almost out of the blue, the UN passes Resolution 2758:

2758 (XXVI). Restoration of the lawful rights of the People's Republic of China in the United Nations

The General Assembly,

Recalling the principles of the Charter of the United Nations,

Considering that the restoration of the lawful rights of the People's Republic of China is essential both for the protection of the Charter of the United Nations and for the cause that the United Nations must serve under the Charter,

Recognizing that the representatives of the Government of the People's Republic of China are the only lawful representatives of China to the United Nations and that the People's Republic of China is one of the five permanent members of the Security Council,

Decides to restore all its rights to the People's Republic of China and to recognize the representatives of its Government as the only legitimate representatives of China to the United Nations, and to expel forthwith the representatives of Chiang Kai-shek from the place which they unlawfully occupy at the United Nations and in all the organizations related to it.

Ouch!

True, Chiang Kai-shek was no sweetie. He was a ruthless tyrant who was responsible for the White Terror that cost the lives of thousands of people. Mao's policies, however, resulted in many more deaths; millions, in fact. Resolution 2758 left Taiwan in Limbo.

It is a country that is not a country. It is unrepresented and excluded from international politics to this day.

Things need not be so bad

Taiwan could be enriched by a union with China, but it would have to be one that could guarantee a certain level of autonomy. The problem is that Xi's China is not that sort of a place. The erosion of liberties that we are witnessing in Hong Kong and the "Autonomous Region" of Xinjiang are also occurring in other parts of China.

Despite having been seeped in authoritarianism, Deng Xiaoping, who was China's leader until 1989, had started the momentum for a freer and more open society. Since then China has flourished.

Sadly, Xi seems bent on dragging it back from some of its newfound liberties. It is not the system that is letting China down, it is its leader. Xi's stance on Taiwan is also intransigent; and aggressive.

He threatens to use force if Taiwan tries to officially distance itself from the PRC and punishes any mention of it as a separate country. Beijing has also been bulling or bribing the few nations that still recognise Taiwan to abandon it. Some have. Currently only 16 UN countries and the Holy See, recognise Taiwan.

Taiwan has been stepping back from its claim to the sovereignty of mainland China. However, it is in a difficult position. The PRC never had jurisdiction over Taiwan, but if Taiwan formally renounces its claim to the whole of China, things may change quickly. Taiwan, as the continuation of the ROC, has a certain foundation in history.

Take that away and where does it stand? It would be as good as declaring full independence from China as a new nation, or admitting to being subject to the rule of the PRC.



Either scenario would give China a pretext to invade Taiwan. So, ironically, Taiwan's claim to sovereignty over the whole of China, (the PRC as well as the ROC) is less provocative to China (PRC) than it agreeing to forego that claim. This is a ridiculous situation that perpetuates the status quo.



The way forward

The only way forward, then, is for two enlightened leaders to sit together and find a mutually beneficial solution. This, of course cannot happen until the PRC changes its imperialistic attitude and need to dominate. A fairer and more impartial UN could also help by acknowledging the absurdity of the situation and trying to do something about it. This too is unlikely while nations fear to incur the wrath of China. The more time passes, however, the more the "countries" will drift apart. The government in Beijing could have more to lose in such a scenario, but only if it cares about what the people of Taiwan want. So far, that does not appear to be the case.

last May when same-sex marriage was legalised in the country. This, despite a referendum held last November, in which 72% of the population had voted against allowing same-sex marriage.

Two years earlier, Taiwan's supreme court had ruled that limiting the definition of marriage to couples of the opposite sex was unconstitutional and the government was given two years to change the law.


The referendum was triggered by religious and traditionalist groups who hoped to undermine the ruling by showing that it was unpopular. Following the reform of the Referendum Act in December 2017, questions could be put to a public ballot, as long as long as this was petitioned by 1.5% of the electorate. This is a consultative process, not a legally binding one. The government of Tsai Ing-wen did not give in to the pressure and legislators backed the

Government Bill, putting justice before numbers. This is real democracy.

Might is not right and nor are numbers

Numbers cannot change something that is wrong into something that is right. Prejudice against the LGBTQ is rampant around the world. In fact, homosexuality is still illegal in 72 countries, that is over a third of the nations of the world. In some it is punishable by death. The prevalence of prejudice does not make it right. Quite the contrary, it makes it even more vicious. The same applies to all breaches of human rights; and there are many. Those that hide behind religion or tradition are particularly pernicious.

The value of trees

The importance of forests cannot be overstated. They provide essential habitats for land-based species: 80% of them, in fact. People also depend of forests for jobs. According to the WWF, over 54 million jobs are directly or indirectly dependant on the forests sector. For some people, the forest is intricately linked their way of life. Even more importantly, trees are essential for a healthy biosphere. They are instrumental in purifying the air and fresh water, as well as preventing flooding, landslides and land degradation. And then, of course, there is climate change, to which deforestation contributes considerably.

Deforestation

Despite this vital role forests play, about half of the world's forests have been already been cleared and they are disappearing by the minute: the equivalent of 27 football fields a minute, in fact! Agriculture, much of it for cattle farming, is the chief cause, with subsistence and commercial farming accounting for up to 80% of the problem.

Every little helps

When I lived in the north of France, a couple of decades ago, I had planted a small forest in the grounds of my house. I revisited the site via satellite images recently only to find that only few trees were left. I guess a few trees are better than none.

The important thing is that we all contribute those few trees in any way we can. Here is one idea that can help, submitted by **Rebecca Ridolf**.

A daughter on the verge of a forced relationship with the Hijab and her mother's resistance to the start of this misery – an opera? Hardly what one would expect as the theme for one. Yet, this familiar uneasiness amongst many women and girls in Iran provides just that.

Il Velo e il bastone, The Veil and the Stick, is a new opera by **Ariana Yekrangi**, with a libretto by Adriano Liberto. It echoes the voices of the Girls of Enghelab Street, a series of protests against the compulsory use of the hijab in Iran. These protests were inspired by Vida Movahed in December 2017. She had tied her white headscarf to a stick and started waving it around like a flag while standing on a crate in a crowded Revolution Street in Tehran.

The future of women's rights in Iran and the Middle East looks bright and promising and this opera is indeed the first of its kind to reflect upon such a movement with this art form. The opera, which is only just over fifteen minutes long, is written for a 14-member chamber orchestra.
